- Choose a business name
- Select a business structure
 - Sole Proprietorship, LLC, Corporation, Partnership, and Tax-exempt
 - Register your business with the state https://mybiz.colorado.gov/intro

- Register with governing entities
 - Get an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the IRS
 - Get necessary licenses and permits
- Write a brief business plan
 - Go to US Small Business Administration to download business plan templates: https://www.sba.gov/document/supportsample-business-plans
 - Most small businesses can use the lean business plan template.

5 Financial Set-up

How much will it take to start your business?

- Estimate your startup costs: equipment, rents, inventory, utilities, six months of labor costs, taxes, permits, insurance, professional fees, and etc.
- Understand what you owe in taxes
- What do you need in working capital to cover six months to a year of expenses before you're profitable?

How will you finance your business?

- Secure funding (personal savings, loans, investors)
- Estimate your sales for 2-3 years
- Create a Profit and Loss or Income
 Statement with your revenues or sales
 versus recurring expenses

Establish sound accounting practices

- Open a bank account
- Get accounting software
- Create a system to track your invoices and expenses (receipts)
- Buy business insurance necessary for your occupation
- Hire an accountant to help

6 Set Up Operations

Pick a location

- Check the zoning
- Get your occupational license from the local government

Hire employees

- If you have full-time employees, you need workers' compensation insurance.
- Understand labor laws, payroll taxes, and employee benefits
- Get payroll software
- Train your employees
- Purchase equipment, supplies, and software
- Establish supplier relationships
- 7 Marketing
- Create a logo, website, social media channels

- Think about how you get the word out about your new business
- How do you attract customers?
- Set aside money for marketing

8 Launch your business

Create a launch plan

- Have a grand opening, working with a local chamber of commerce
- Advertise the grand openning
- Contact local news media
- Activate your sales channels
